

## Winnua School Feeding Program Success in Mozambique

After starting in 2015, with only 330 children, the program had increased to serve about 3,500 children by March 2020 when the Covid crisis forced closure of the schools. In February, Winnua, which is a private company also making soy yogurt for sale, saw the installation of a new, higher capacity SoyCow 30 system which would allow an increase of almost 100 L/hr to their capacity. MM technician Tom Agalo came from Kenya to do the installation and training.

The night shift was then able to produce 700 liters of milk and the day shift 500 liters. Some of the milk is made into yogurt and sold to the public in Mocuba. The distribution to the closest schools is done on foot, while the schools further away are supplied by car.

Winnua also gives soymilk to its staff every day to increase health and secure a daily intake of protein. With the new system added, they were able to increase the school feeding program with 600 more children. At present, because of the emergency situation, the only institution that benefits from the school feeding program is the nearby orphanage “Menino Jesus” that hosts 50 children in Mocuba.

With the new system in place Winnua is now poised to restart their popular school feeding program and commercial soy yogurt sales, and hopefully this will be soon. This is the most successful soymilk school feeding program MM has seen in Africa and has the capacity to increase to 8,000 children a day.
